ELMS RETURN TO ELM STREET

This fall, look for five new disease-resistant Elm trees to be planted in the park along both sides of Elm Street boundary of Fisher Park! Your neighborhood Park

Committee volunteers have expended significant hours throughout 2008, developing planting plans and a park management policy and offering park walks to help us envision improvements in our shared City park.

During recent park workdays, invasive plants have been removed along the creek bed in the east park in accordance with Greensboro Parks and Recreation Department policy. New plantings of native species are planned for this fall and winter along the stream – and in other areas of the park over the next several years.

Thanks to neighbors Sally and Wayne Atwood (PosterPrints) for creating and donating signs posted near work areas. The Park Committee and its enthusiastic chairperson David Craft are anxious to hear your thoughts as we move ahead. Attend the November 16 annual meeting to see plans. DECEMBER LUMINARIA DISPLAY



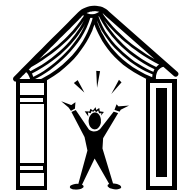
It's almost time for our neighborhood's annual Luminaria display! Included with this newsletter is your Fisher Park Luminaria order form and instructions for participation. Our Luminaria Kit-Building Party is open to everyone, Wednesday, December 10, 6 p.m. at Rob Pope's house, 803 Simpson Street, 638-7706. Rob will kindly offer light refreshments to volunteers. Soon thereafter, volunteers deliver luminaria kits to Block Captains, who in turn kindly deliver kits to your doorstep. On Sunday, December 14 at dusk, add sand or litter to each bag, place a candle cup inside, light candles, and enjoy our glowing annual display. Walk illuminated sidewalks with friends, carol, or organize block parties! Two generous neighbors invite the neighborhood to their Luminaria open house events:

If the Sunday December 14 Luminaria display is canceled due to bad weather, this open house will shift to Sunday December 21 along with the rescheduled Luminaria display. If both December 14 and 21 have inclement weather, this open house will be cancelled. Simply enjoy your Luminarias another time.

COMING TO SOUTHWEST FISHER PARK

It's been in the back of our minds for years, and now the Guilford County School Administration has openly discussed the possibility of leaving their Eugene Street location in years to come. We all recognize the current School Administration buildings and parking lots, spanning blocks bounded by Simpson Street, Fisher Avenue, Wharton Street, and Florence Street, will be redeveloped *some* day, most likely as high density residential or mixed use. Large undeveloped tracts of land near downtown are rare gems and should be snatched up for significant development; but "by whom," "how," and "when" we're unlikely to be privy. We should anticipate the transition to be part of a complicated land-swap, and most likely accomplished well before the neighborhood receives any details.



It is extremely important for affected neighbors to meet, envision, and present an overview of your primary wishes for this land, both to your neighborhood and to our School Administration, requesting your wishes be valued among business-lead stakeholders. The best compromises surface when we articulate our highest wishes and place them on the discussion table as early as possible.

Our Aycock neighbors have twice received grants to hold a design charrette (a series of short, intense, professionally led design workshops) to envision options for future development of one remaining large piece of undeveloped land across the railroad tracks, the Dunleath property. During a design charrette, professional urban designers introduce cutting edge infill development principles and work with neighbors to document positive options.

Coincidentally, the Aycock neighborhood invites you to a Dunleith property public charrette, November 18-21 at Revolution Mills Entertainment Studios. Details will be posted at <http://www.historicaycock.org/>. Neighbors nearest our School Administration property may wish to meet

casually, or to plan a professionally-guided charrette, to document their highest wishes for School Administration property. You might consider a Historic District overlay or create a neighbor-defined Neighborhood Conservation Overlay.

While not naively anticipating that our wishes will supersede a developer's, if neighbors initiate, coordinate, and document their wishes, there's a much greater chance for mutually positive outcomes, assuredly greater than passively awaiting developer's plans whose best interests may not complement your own. We encourage you to attend Aycock's charrette, then meet, brainstorm, inquire, and bring your wishes to our neighborhood Board.

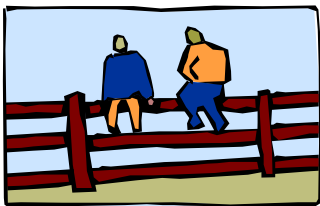
FOUNDING FAMILIES
